[Ex. Seizure disorder needing rectal RX at school to prevent prolonged seizure activity] |
| July 1, 2014 | Recommendations for level of nursing services for general student population <br> - 1 RN/school nurse for every 3,500 students | General Student Population-Students with intermittent acute illness/injury events and normal growth and development. [Ex. Sudden seizure occurring at school with no prior history] |
| July 1, 2016 | - 1 RN/school nurse for every 2,500 students | Students have physical and/or social-emotional conditions that are currently uncomplicated and predictable-i.e. Assessment by RN; |
| July 1, 2018 | - 1 RN/school nurse for every $\mathbf{1 , 5 0 0}$ students | referral for medical evaluation and treatment; health education. Occasional student monitoring (bi-weekly to annually). Provide |
| July 1, 2020 | - 1 RN/school nurse for every 750 students | direction and training for emergency response at least annually. [Ex. Seizure disorder with no break through seizures in past 2 years; on medication.] |
