I was able to attend the NASN conference in Denver, along with Lisa Kern, NASN Director, Wally Colon, Recording Secretary and Robyn Hathaway, Vendor Chair. NASN produced some very interesting and powerful speakers, and I was once

again reminded of how important school nurses are in the lives of the nation's children.

A huge breadth of knowledge is required to adequately care for our student population. You monitor and treat chronic diseases like diabetes and asthma, you carry out complex treatments, and you assess, screen and refer all manner of health conditions. In recent years, you have also had to deal with the toxic stress caused by frequent mass shootings, which af-

fects the staff as well as the children. So, I want to say a huge THANK YOU for being a school nurse! High profile hospital positions may have bigger salaries, but no one impacts the same number of lives that you do!

I want to share something with you all that made my heart smile. I was running a free Back to School immunization clinic last week and in came an older lady walking with a stick. She was followed by three very skinny small boys, and a girl I estimated to be in her late teens. As I handed out forms and started to gather

some information, the girl proudly stated that, "We just got custody of the boys last week." Ultimately, I discovered that the older lady was the great-grandmother of the boys, and the grandmother of the girl, who is sixteen years old. The girl is the boys' aunt and has been raised by her grandmother. She is now helping to raise the boys. All of the little ones were behind with their vaccines, and the sixteen-year old surrogate Mom

was ready to hold and comfort them as they got their shots. There is a purpose

in my relating this encounter. Just as we assess our students, we should remember to stop and assess ourselves every so often. We all have unconscious bias due to cultural upbringing and life experiences. We cannot always totally extinquish it, but we can recognize it and avoid it driving our responses to en-



counters. I really did ask myself how I would have responded, had I seen those three skinny little kids with runny noses in a school clinic. I might not have known their history, and I could have been a little critical of their immunization status. I feel fortunate to have had the opportunity to be reminded that there is always a story.

Impact of Mental Health on School Nursing

As I sit here trying to write on the subject of mental health, I am struggling to know what to say to you as school nurse. Where do I even begin on the vast topic that has such a significant impact on our practice? I can discuss the statistics such as one out of five children are diagnosed with a mental illness, half of all mental illnesses are diagnosed by age 14, or that only about seven percent of our students even see a primary physician. However, that doesn't even begin to skim the surface of the impact that mental health has on our student's lives or the culture of schools (Mental Health First Aid). The real question I ponder is, "What is our role as a school nurse when it comes to mental health?".

As a school nurse, we play a pivotal role in the early identification of mental illnesses and connecting our students with the appropriate resources. We create a "safe space" for our students to share their emotions or have a quiet place to regroup. We advocate for our students every day and are tasked with educating students, their families, and our staff about mental health illnesses. We empathize with our students

and must recognize that when a student comes to us, our mindset needs to be "what is going on with them?" versus "what is wrong with them?" in order to provide the necessary support a student may need.

The greatest take away for me as a mental health coach is summed up in this simple phrase "the impact of one". What does this phrase mean to us as school nurses? The single most significant protective factor for children, which decreases the impact of mental illness, is feeling close to just one adult (Mental Health First Aid). We have the opportunity to be this trusting adult and improve our student's academic success and emotional wellbeing. Simple things such as check-ins. listening nonjudgmentally, providing hope, being genuine, respectful, and providing emotional support contribute to building a trusting relationship with our students. As we begin the 2020 school year, I urge you to remember the impact you can have on a student's life by taking the time to build a trusting relationship!

Soooooooooo, what **IS** this for?


The **2020 FASN Conference**, of course!!!! Only 152 days.... counting from September 1, 2019!!!

I want to present a poster at the FASN convention – where do I start?

Pick an area that interests you that you truly want to find out more about. Nutrition, activity and school performance – should schools do brain breaks? Have you started a program that has shown positive results and want to share it with colleagues? Breakfast in the classroom – has your school done it and have seen improvement with students?

As with all research, what is your hypothesis? Data collection, literature, (not lit review), overall results – was your hypothesis right? If not, why and what could you have done differently, if anything? Research is not perfect; that is why it is done.

- Pick an area that interests you that you truly want 2. How can I visually share my research with to find out more about. Nutrition, activity and school performance should schools do brain graphs, photos, images?

Hello FASN Members! I sure hope you are heading into the 2019-2020 school year with renewed hope and an unwa-

vering passion for the important work you do each day to support Florida students. As your Director, I was blessed to be able to attend the NASN summer board workshop and meeting followed by the annual conference in Colorado. I'll be sharing a few snippets that I hope will enhance your work this year!

During our Board of Directors meeting, Nina Fekaris closed out her Presidency by reminding all of us to promote school nurse voice: "Our voice can give support to a belief, clear up a misun-

derstanding, challenge prejudices and assumptions or perpetrate them. It can lift people up or tear them down. Our voices can advocate for students with mental health concerns, building a bridge for parents

and students with special needs, and integrating students experiencing acute and chronic health conditions. Our voice can ensure equal access and a safe place for all children to learn and grow." Nina's words were echoed by Laurie Combe in her inaugural address after she was installed as our NASN President. She encourages us to use our "voice of advocacy...for the children in our care" and describes school nurse intervention "as public health intervention Gold".

The NASN conference was kicked off by the Executive Director & Co-Founder of United We Dream, Cristina Jimenez, "Navigating Undocumented Life in the School System". She asked school nurses to challenge our institutional systems when we know something is wrong, suggesting that we have transformative power within our institutions. As an ally, please step up to

bring safety and change to your community. Remember, we want the safest place for our students to be the school nurse office!

Another memorable session entitled "Bringing Mindfulness Into the Health Office: Helping Yourself, Helping Your Students" showed me how to practice 'boxed breathing' and discover the importance of mindfulness spaces in school clinics (can be created using bean bag, coloring books, fidgets, glitter jar, timer, beads, books, music). Using mindfulness can decrease the size of the amygdala and increase gray matter; essential for students who have or are experiencing childhood trauma. To learn more about Mindfulness from the child's perspective, watch

Just Breathe. Other conference sessions covered topics related to depression, research, human trafficking, vaping, attendance, cannabis, ACEs, sexual abuse and more Livestream is

ing a bridge for parents more. <u>Livestream</u> is and students with special needs, and integrating available for 90 days for those who registered.

I leave you with one last resource, shared by Nina in her message to the Board. Please consider reading Dr. Erin Maughan's article, "Breaking the Glass Cage: The Power of Data, Courage and Voice". Her powerful words should serve as an inspiration for all of us: "As school nurses better understand our value, own our power, use data, take charge and have courage, we will be the force needed to shatter the glass cage, move the profession of school nursing forward, and more importantly optimize student health". Thank you for your courage and dedication!
