





#### PROMOTING SAFE BEHAVIORS

Comprehensive Treatment Program for Youth with Problematic Sexual Behavior

The Promoting Safe Behaviors (PSB) Program is a grant-funded, evidence-based, collaborative approach that works with youth who have engaged in sexually acting out or sexually harmful behavior to provide education, consultation and support.





#### Goals

- Equip professionals with tools to support caregivers with the knowledge and skills to provide inclusive and comprehensive sex education that addresses the diverse needs of youth, including those from marginalized communities.
- Increase caregiver engagement in sex education by highlighting the importance of their role in promoting healthy sexual development and relationships among youth. Navigate best practices in teaching sex education while insuring aligning with family/cultural values.
- Enhance caregivers' communication skills to facilitate meaningful conversations about sexuality, consent, boundaries, and healthy relationships with youth.
- Create a foundation for lifelong learning and healthy decision-making by empowering caregivers and youth with the tools to navigate complex issues related to sexuality with confidence, respect and open dialogue







#### Sexual Development – Biological, Psychological, and Social Factors

Political, Legal, Philosophical, spiritual, ethical and moral values have significant influence on sexual development.



#### What We Know About Caregiver Engagement:

- Trauma Treatment: For most evidenced based intervention for trauma there is a caregiver component
  - Meta Analysis in 2022-Caregivers have significant role in effective treatment of PTSD. Also had a role in internalizing, externalizing, social and cognitive challenges



#### What We Know About Caregiver Engagement:

#### Sexual health:

- Communication is key. Research shows a healthier outcome in several areas including Social-Emotional (school readiness, long term behavior); Risk behaviors (decrease in substance use and fewer suicide attempts); Physical and Behavioral health (lower prevalence of negative health factors)
- Communication about sex education with youth has shown delayed age in first sexual experience and less sexual partners over the life span
- Comprehensive sex education has shown to lower teen pregnancy rate
- Key Components of PSB-CBT-Caregiver components: Behavior Parent Training, rules about sexual health and boundaries, sex education, and abuse prevention skills



















# Nearly all teens have access to a smartphone at home

Note: Those who did not give an answer are not shown.



#### Pornography

- •15% report viewing Porn before age 11
- •73% report viewing Porn before age 13
- •29% accidently viewed; 44% intentionally
- •45% of teens who reported watching porn noted that it gave helpful information
- Roughly 1/3 of porn shows consent

A smaller share (27%) agreed that sex in online pornography accurately shows the way most people have sex.










#### **Favorite Times to Watch Porn**








#### Traffic by Phone, Desktop & Tablet

### Barriers for Professionals

- Own Discomfort
   Values and beliefs about sex
   Concern over boundaries with clients
- Lack of training
- Feeling outside of clinical scope
- Own trauma history

#### How professionals can find comfort and confidence in this topic

- Own education on sex education, body changes, sexual behavior
- Good supervision
- Practice of positive regard
- Challenging values around sex education and sexual behavior
  - Ex: from sex positive parents
  - Sexual Attitude Reassessment (SAR) training
  - Supervision/consultation



#### Barriers to caregivers engaging in the topic

- Education
- Sex health history
- Trauma
- Cultural/religious views
- Misconception about teaching sex education



According to a study reported by the National Campaign to Reduce Teen Pregnancy, nearly 90% of adults surveyed said that although they want to talk with their children about sex, they do not know what to say, how to say it, or when to start.


#### **PLISSIT Model**

- Model developed by Annon, J. 1976 (citation at bottom of page)
- Used to assess the level of intervention in therapy based on client
   need and comfort level discussing topics related to sexuality
- Some clients may only need permission while others may need more levels of intervention
- Ex-PLISSIT model developed by Davis
   & Taylor (2006) emphasizes the

- permission giving, and allows for more dialogue and discussion between practitioner and client
- Emphasis on psychoeducation, acknowledging sensitive nature of topic and that clinician is an appropriate and unbiased place to process questions and concerns



#### **PLISSIT Model**






# Teaming up with caregivers

- Curiosity and permission
  - Values and Beliefs
  - Their journey
  - Share resources
  - Barriers
- Reinforce expertise
- Continual conversation
- Therapeutic Rapport
  - Normalize the discomfort and create a safe space











Teaching Inclusive and Comprehensive Sex Education

Goal: Youth to grow up to have a healthy outlook on sexual health, happy relationships and able to communicate about their bodies and needs.


#### **Inclusiveness**

- Why do we need to help support caregivers in inclusive sex education?
- 55% of Americans report never having has the "talk" with caregivers (Siecus)
- Those who had the "talk" rated the effectiveness as 2.6/5
- The average age for discussing sex education with caregivers is 11



# **Inclusive Sex Education**

- Gender neutral language
- Sex-positive, non-pathologizing language
- Exploration of all aspects of sex identity-Gender Unicorn, sex orientation, identity, abuse prevention
- Accounts for cultural and religious values
- Assesses for variations in comfort level
- Tailored to developmental level and cognitive ability







#### **Comprehensive Sex Education**

- Addresses all areas of sexual development
- Centered around consent, autonomy and choice
- Explores "sex" but also includes; relationship skills, social skills, boundaries, conception and fertilization,
- Grounded in scientific research but incorporates emotional, interpersonal and psychological factors
- Abuse prevention
- Sexual development
- Hygiene and puberty
- Address online safety and sexual behaviors





#### How to Share with Caregivers

- Bibliotherapy
- Media resources
- Language training
- Psycho-education and awareness
- Cultural awareness and sensitivity to caregiver's values



#### **Fertilization**

#### FERTILIZATION OF AN EGG CAN HAPPEN IN OR OUTSIDE OF THE HUMAN BODY!

Fertilization outside the body (In Vitro Fertilization): A process in which mature eggs are collected from ovaries and fertilized by sperm in a lab. Fertilized eggs can then be injected into the uterus or frozen for future transplants. (Cleveland Clinic)

Fertilization inside the body happens when the vagina and penis fit together. Sperm from the penis can swim up and join an egg that's been released from the ovary and the egg can become fertilized. (Raising Children.net)

#### Responding to Caregiver Concerns

- Allow them time to share their concerns
- Ask what comes up for them and what would make them feel more comfortable
- Invite them into the conversation and highlight their role, expertise on their child (PLISSIT)
- Ask permission to share
- Respect cultural views
- Engage in a collaborative approach and team up with caregiver
- Let caregiver take the lead -they are the expert on their child/family


