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


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Intersectionality & Experiences Are Critical





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
But What Is a Fork Anyways?


- Be clear on definitions. For example, gender and sex are not necessarily the same.

- LGBTQ+ culture and language and communication is fluid and dynamic.


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




Of those who attempted suicide in the past year, comparison across the number of people they live with respecting their pronouns...










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
















Entry Points to Child Maltreatment Systems

- Physical abuse
 - 30% experience family violence after coming out
 - 1 in 3 reported being physically threatened or harmed in their lifetime
- Sexual abuse
 - Teens 2.9x greater risk
 - Teen boys 4.9x greater risk
- [Physical neglect] Homelessness and housing instability
 - 40% (640,000) homeless youth identify as LGBTQ+
 - 29% report experiencing homelessness, being kicked out, or running away
- · Psychological abuse more difficult to determine





 Overrepresentation in foster care system: 1 out of 5

- Increased frequency of placement disruptions: 19.6% vs. 8.6%
- Increased risk of suicidal ideation, depression, sexually transmitted infections




LGBTQ+ Youth and Juvenile Justice

- More likely to be targeted and stopped by police
- Out-of-home placements and detention more common and for longer durations
- More likely to not be given due process
- More likely to be prosecuted for ageappropriate consensual sexual activity



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LGBTQ+ Affirming/ative Services An approach to services that embraces a positive view of LGBTQ+ identities and relationships, and addresses the negative influences that homophobia, transphobia, heterosexism, and ciscism have on the lives of LGBTQ+ people. Affirmative Services = Culturally Competent

- Access to and receipt of culturally competent services improves outcomes, short and long-term
- Identity pride and social supports
 - Resiliency factors that buffer against the impact of LGBTQ+ minority stress
 - · Child abuse professionals can support both factors through being affirming
- On the right track: LGBTQ+ youth report...
 - 78% have access to at least one in-person LGBTQ-affirming space
 - 85% have high levels of support from at least one person

Being an Affirming Professional Involves...

- Engage in self-reflection to identify own thoughts, beliefs, etc.
- Get and stay educated and keep up with the current knowledge.
- Acknowledge that each person has own unique story.






Tips for Affirmative Professionals

- Be open and actionable about your commitment to providing and creating affirmative services and spaces to all clients and reflect that commitment in policies.
- Use the correct terminology; when in doubt, ask!
- Maintain confidentiality and privacy of LGBTQ+ you
- Get involved (local community and national/global issues) and know the local resources.

Planning for Service Delivery

- Remember...
 - These are still kids and teens.
 - Services are still services; you know what to do.
- Consider planning for more time
- Talk with youth and caregivers separately.

- Orient the youth to services, as needed.
- Use typical engagement questions.
- Support the youth where they are now (i.e., it is not a phase):
 - If you can't provide support right now, then how can you be less rejecting?

Exploring Social and Sexual Histories


- Use gender neutral terminology and/or terms used by the youth:
 - · Sex assigned at birth
 - · Sexual/gender identity
- Inquire about who knows and what about the youth's SOGIE*.
- Assess safety for youth at home, school, community, dating/sexual relationships.
- Obtain sexual history using gender neutral, open-ended questions
 - "Who are you attracted to?"
 - "Are you dating anyone?"
 - "How many sexual partners have you had, including males, females, and other genders?"

When Caregivers & Professionals Don't Know

- · Never out a youth.
- Collaborate with the youth to identify a plan:
 - · To share or not, and with whom
 - · What to share
 - · Safety, as needed
 - Ongoing support



- To tell the family member(s) or
- To start the conversation
- When others are surprised, normalize reactions (e.g., feelings, time to adjust, etc.) and, if appropriate, acknowledge caregivers' fears about child safety.

Engaging with Others Who Are Not Affirming

- Adjust response based on their role (e.g., professional vs. caregiver).
- Be respectful.



- Confirm your goal: Safe, happy, and healthy children not to change beliefs.
- Listen and work toward gaining an understanding.
- Reminder of common (and collaborative) foundation:
 - · Professional: Safety, well-being
 - · Caregivers: Love, safety, well-being


