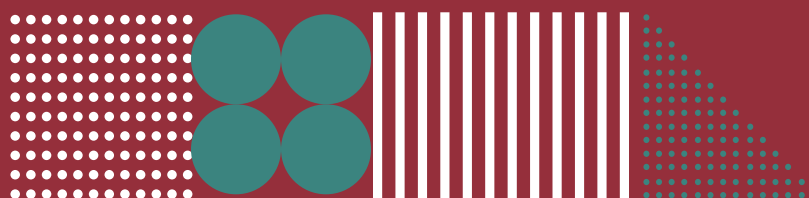
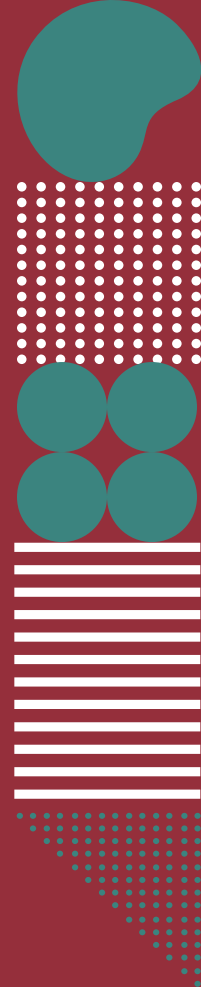

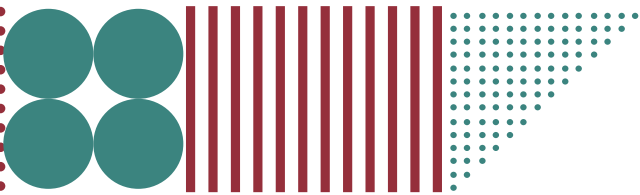
What a year, 2020 brought

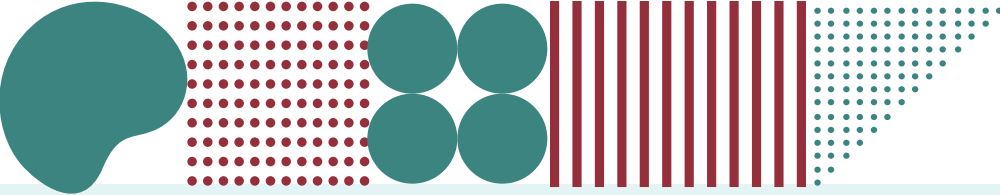
- Global pandemic

90-minute weekly concurrent youth and caregiver group sessions

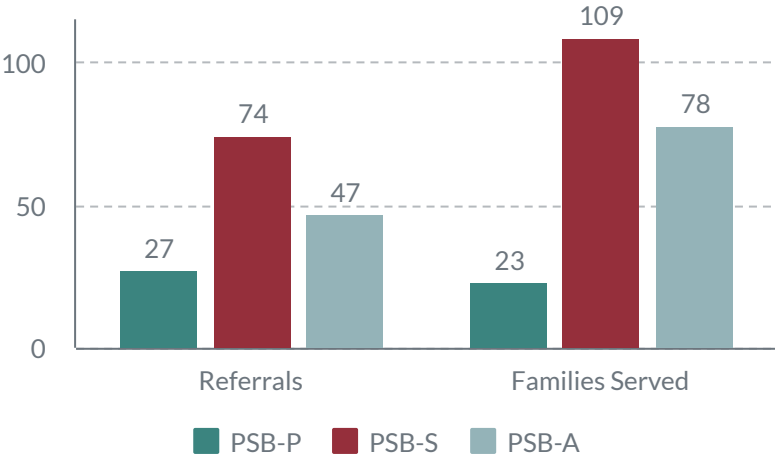
These programs at the Child Study Center, located on the OU Health campus in Oklahoma City, OK are designed to eliminate problematic or illegal sexual behaviors and improve prosocial behavior and adjustment in children and youth, while reducing stress and enhancing skills in parents and other caregivers.



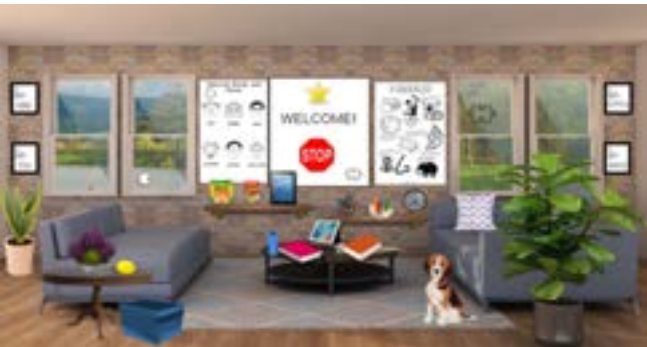
The Preschool Program is now directed by **Erin Taylor, Ph.D.**, while the Adolescent Program is under the new leadership of **Susan Schmidt, Ph.D.** with new lead clinicians, **Natalie Gallo, M.Ed.**, **Ashley Galsky, Ph.D.**, and **Andrew Monroe, LICSW**, who also joined the School-age Program.

TRACKING Referrals and Families Served

In light of the COVID-19 Pandemic, we successfully transitioned our services (intakes, group, and individual family sessions) to Zoom beginning in March, and staff have utilized Google Slide Rooms. Zoom intakes were completed with both caregiver(s) and child present.

Youth & Parent Partnership Boards

Parent Partnership Board (PPB) The PPB is comprised of caregivers who successfully completed PSB-CBT treatment with their children, those nearing completion, and service drop-outs. PPB members play a vital role in informing patient care, patient-center research, and best practices.

The PPB have previously disseminated newsletters on [Talking About the Elephant in the Living Room](#), and [Now What? What to Expect out of Treatment](#), and are currently working on a PSB Survival Guide.



Youth Partnership Board (YPB) The YPB was formed with youth graduated from PSB treatment in order to bring youth voice and lived experiences into the decision making process and training professionals who come into contact with youth with PSB to improve outcomes and services for them and their families.

The YPB created a tip sheet for other youth, and are currently working on additional tip sheets for caregivers and professionals that will be available later this year.

Making a Difference in Oklahoma

Oklahoma Regional Trainings



The Center on Child Abuse and Neglect hosted regional trainings for all professionals in the field of child maltreatment in Oklahoma. OK Interagency Workgroup on Children with PSB

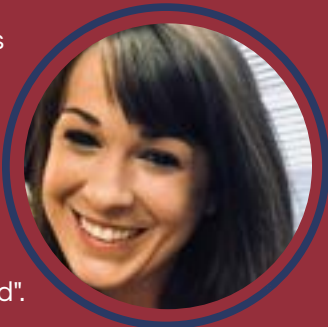
In response to growing concern about Oklahoma's response to children with PSB, this workgroup examined current policies and practices of state and local systems who address children with PSB. Guiding principles, recommendations, and training materials were developed and disseminated to the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth, leadership of the Department of Human Services and Children's Advocacy Center, and Multidisciplinary Team associations. Oklahoma Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Workgroup

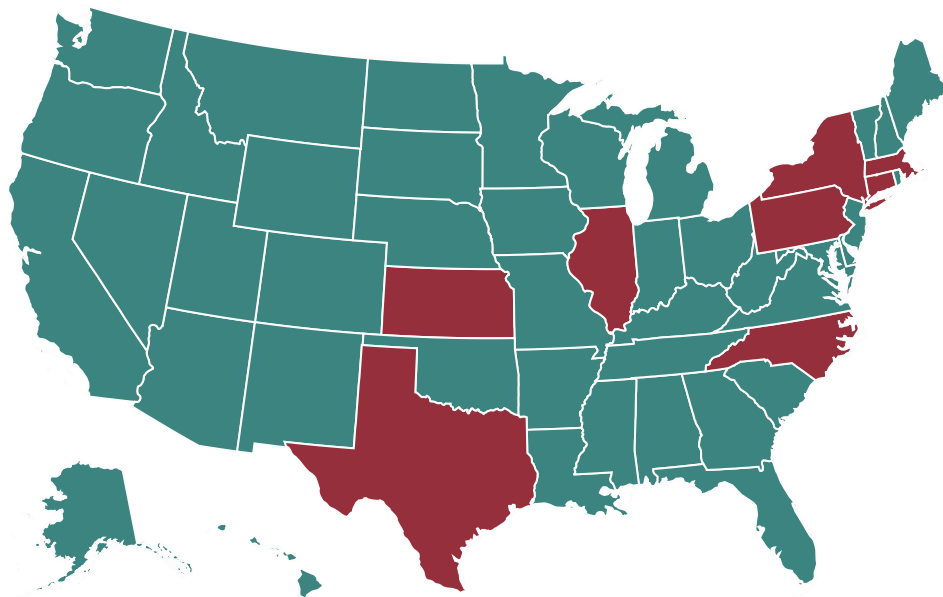
The Oklahoma Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Workgroup members from state and nonprofit agencies with programs focused on child sexual abuse prevention, prevention of problematic sexual behavior of youth, sex education, and/or healthy relationships for youth. The Workgroup distributed a survey to inventory and assess the gaps of child abuse prevention and related services in Oklahoma. Activities planned for 2021 include dissemination of a directory of child sexual abuse prevention programs, review of research on child sexual abuse prevention, summarize gaps in services with recommendations to fill the gaps. Further, in collaboration with the Oklahoma Department of Education, the workgroup has begun to develop example policies for schools and other youth service organizations to address child sexual abuse prevention. Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs

In August 2020, Sharon "Shel" Millington-Daves, M.A., a licensed professional counselor was hired as the Director of Behavioral Health Services for the Office of Juvenile Affairs. She worked at CCAN prior to this amazing achievement, serving as the Co-Director and lead clinician for both the school-age and adolescent PSB treatment programs, and will design and implement treatment programs across OJA residential programs. OJA Interim Executive Director Rachel Holt said "Millington-Daves expertise in early childhood prevention, diversion and intervention programs will help the agency meet the growing need".

The OU PSB-CBT training program has expanded significantly in 2020. Finding successful implementation is more likely achieved with a learning collaborative model, the training team is growing their capacity for LC training. With this strategy, service agency leadership is invested in and actively involved in the training, as well as key community agencies (e.g., child protective services, law enforcement, and schools) to make necessary organizational and policy changes to fully implement and sustain evidence-based services and developmentally informed policies and practice. OJJDP Cooperative Agreements

NCSBY: Implementing Community-Based Effective Interventions for Youth with PSB

Since 2010, OJJDP has issued cooperative agreements to community programs to implement comprehensive, coordinated, community-based evidence-based practices to address problematic and illegal sexual behavior (PISB) of youth. Remarkably, sites have been successful at overcoming multiple agency, system, and policy level barriers to establish effective procedures and programs to facilitate the identification, referral, access, and engagement in evidence-based practice for youth, child victims, and caregivers.

The Training and Technical Assistance (T/TA) for these programs have been provided by NCSBY. NCSBY provides training in evidence-based practice for youth with PISB and strategies to be successful to establish community-based management and evidence-based practice for youth with PISB, victims, and families, and improve the community's coordination of services through multidisciplinary teams (MDT). Military Children with PSB: Enhanced Response through TTA for Military Personnel

In response to cases of problematic and illegal sexual behaviors amongst children and youth on military bases, the Department of Defense has committed to improving their response. The complex nature of addressing problematic sexual behaviors of youth is further complicated by the overlapping military and civilian (federal and state) jurisdiction and response. To rapidly respond to the recent outcry regarding problematic sexual behavior of their youth, the military has diligently worked to examine best practices, evidence-based treatments, and the research literature to create an effective, developmentally appropriate response system to Problematic Sexual Behavior of Children and Youth (PSB-CY).

To facilitate this response system and to create a large scale training implementation plan, [NCSBY is providing TTA](#). This Training and Technical Assistance project for the military will facilitate the military's assessment of readiness of military installations to implement the PSB-CY response system, collaborate in the development of guidelines for multidisciplinary response system, (c) provide consultation on the PSB-CY response, provide clinical training on evidence-based treatment including Problematic Sexual Behavior – Cognitive Behavior Therapy, enhance engagement of caregivers and other family members through guidelines and training, and develop guidelines and training on sexual development and response to problematic sexual behavior.

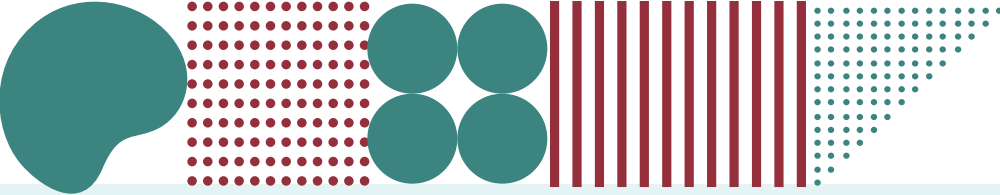

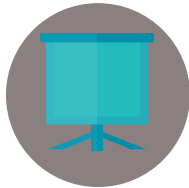

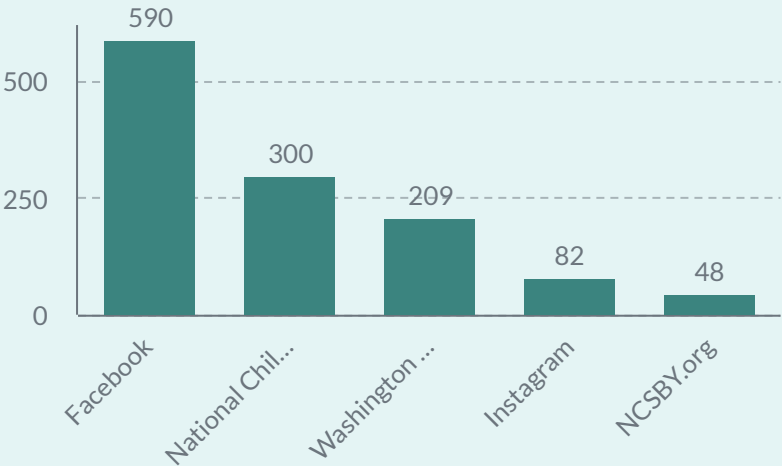
Technology & Social Media



The Clinical Program transformed services to engage families through a virtual platform in order to provide treatment through the global pandemic of COVID-19, as well as integrated RedCap for treatment data collection, continued and expanded collaboration with the CARE Center, and addressed the most vulnerable families in Oklahoma.

Top 5 websites referring to NCSBY.org

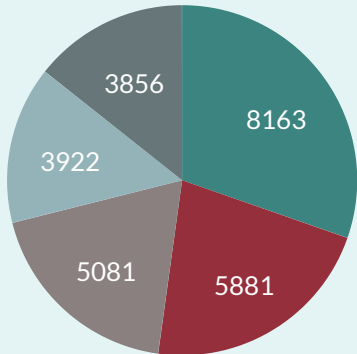


The website received traffic from 112 total referral sources from January 1 - December 31, 2020, with over 227,300 page viewing sessions from 145,000 users.

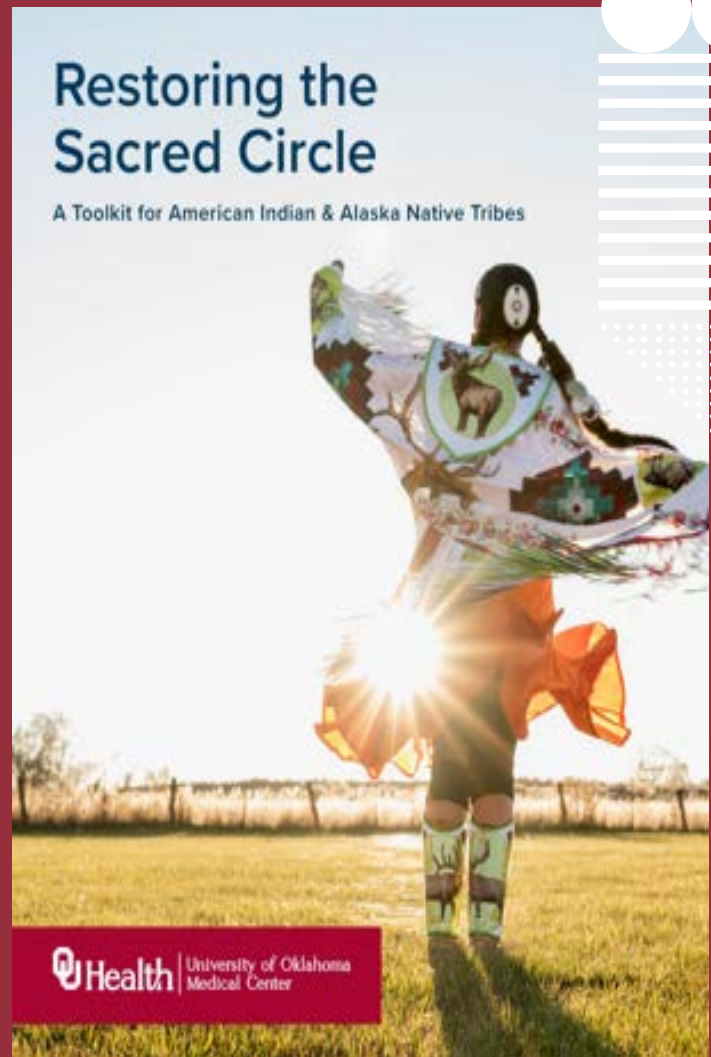

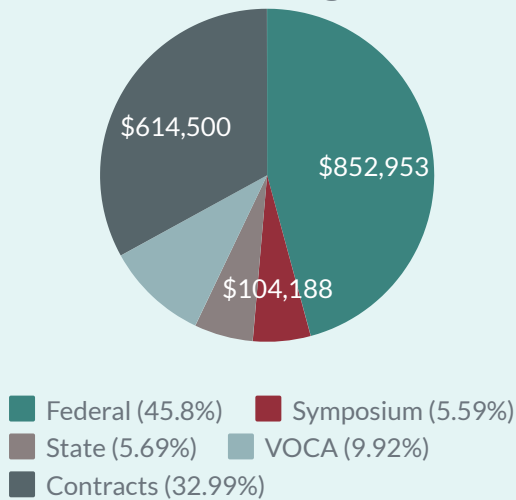

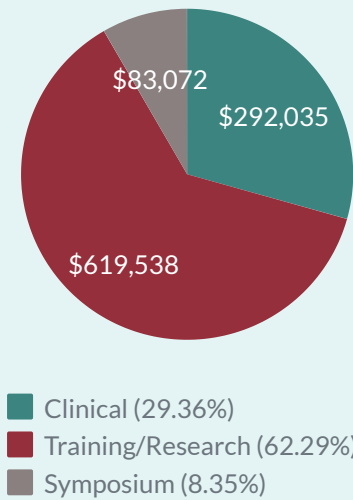

Changes in 2020

The PSB-CBT Training Team has been working diligently in an effort to address racism, social injustices, and marginalized populations, and improve equity in addressing Sexual Orientation Gender Identity. Subcommittee updates are shown below.



Training Role-Plays The trainees have asked, and we have responded! The team has developed role-play recordings to facilitate engagement in training.

- Caregiver Assessment
- Criteria for Graduation

Antiracism Efforts Our team has committed themselves to Antiracism efforts with increasing awareness and focus over the past year. Notable efforts included:

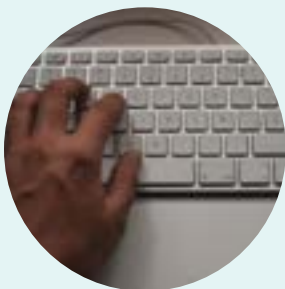
- **Antiracism Summit:** Six section members attended a day-long virtual summit hosted by the National Child Traumatic Stress Network, where team from across the country received anti-racism education from experts in the field and discussed implementation of antiracism policies and practices in their own agencies.
- **Antiracism Book Club:** Building on the goals of the summit, DBP developed a book club to educate section members on antiracism principles, discussing three books so far.
- **Antiracism Committee:** Designed to guide the vision developed through the NCTSN Antiracism Summit. The committee has worked on editing the sections' mission and values to be more inclusive and intentionally committed to antiracism.



Diversity/Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity Committee After recognizing that our PSB-CBT training materials were in-need of necessary adjustments in an effort to make them more inclusive, our Diversity/SOGI subcommittee has been working hard to make this shift. Some specific changes we're excited about are related to specific language used throughout the training materials, shifting of role plays, and increased inclusivity across PSB-CBT modules.



Electronic and Online Sexual Behavior In a year where technology has only become more engrained in our world, the EOSB subcommittee has been working on making sure that we are discussing those behaviors in each component of treatment and helping clinicians feel confident in this area of treatment. This has been by including new scenarios in training, adding a new session around EOSB to the school-age curriculum, and trainings around EOSB.



13-14 Year Old Adaptation Through work with OJJDP and a recognition of the differences young teens have that do not necessarily fit the original school-age model, an adaptation of the school-age model was created for 13 and 14 year olds. After discussing key areas that are different for this age group and conducting an initial training in 2019, this workgroup is revising training for PSB-CBT-S therapists to address early adolescence and collaboration with juvenile justice. With much interest, we plan to have our first round of trainees in this adaption this summer, 2021.

PSB-CBT Within-Agency Trainer (WATER) The PSB-CBT Training Program will host a WATER Training in February 2021. Within-Agency Trainers are individuals who have satisfactorily completed specialized training in the PSB-CBT treatment model in which they were trained. They can provide training within the sponsoring agency to therapists employed or selected by the Agency (e.g., practicum students, interns, new staff).

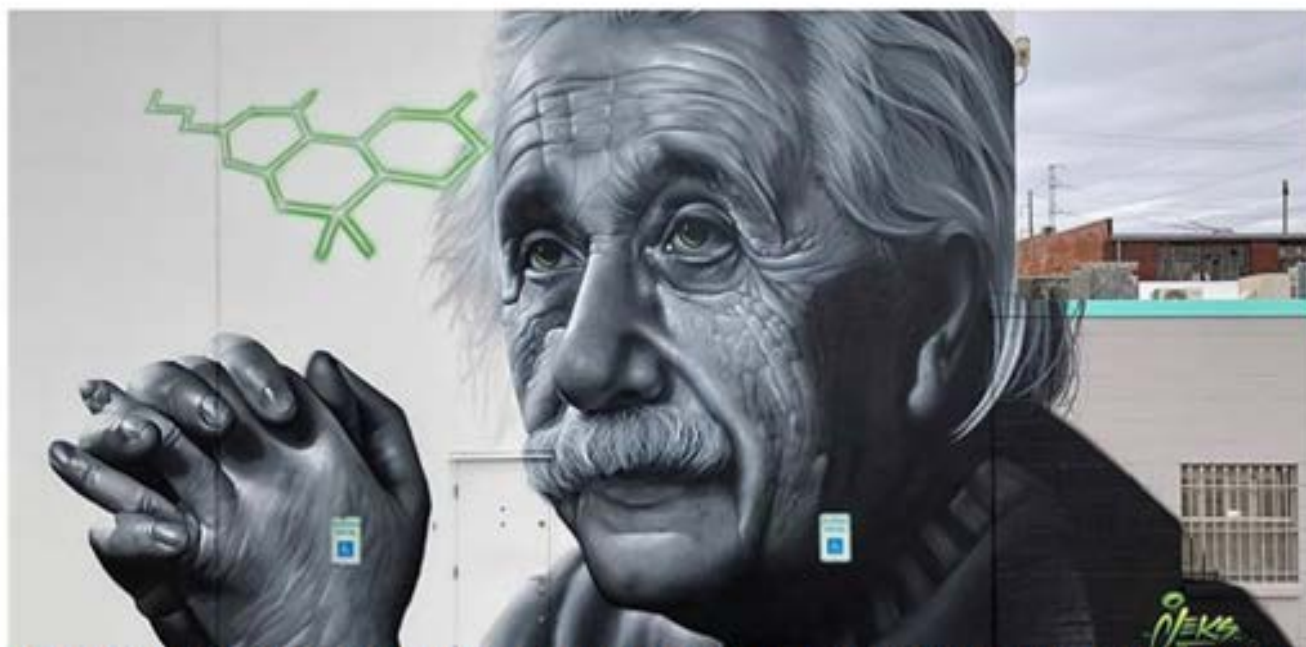


Advanced TF-CBT Training The PSB-CBT Training Program will host multiple trainings for "Implementing Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Preschool and School-age Children with Problematic Sexual Behaviors Related to Trauma" throughout the Spring, Summer, and Fall 2021. This is an advanced TF-CBT training in which support is provided for addressing trauma-related PSB within TF-CBT treatment for children 12 and under. This training is not designed to replace formal training in evidence-based treatment for PSB (e.g., PSB-CBT.)



PSB-CBT Roster The Problematic Sexual Behavior - Cognitive-Behavioral Therapy (PSB-CBT) Roster Committee in collaboration with the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center PSB-CBT Training and Technical Assistance (T/TA) Program developed the training requirements for rostering in the PSB-CBT models for preschool, school-age, and adolescents. Therapists eligible to be rostered in a PSB-CBT model must have completed all training requirements in the model(s), including fidelity requirements, in which trained. Rostered PSB-CBT Therapists are

individuals who have received appropriate training in the evidence-based treatment model and are considered qualified to provide PSB-CBT services to children with problematic sexual behavior, their victims, and their caregivers. Rostered PSB-CBT Therapists will be included on a [public PSB Roster](#) for a three-year period, after which time they would need to complete re-rostering requirements. The PSB-CBT Roster Committee will launch the application early in 2021.

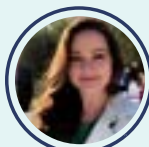

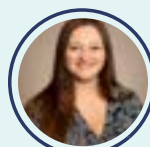

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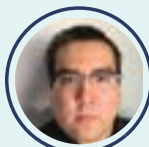
