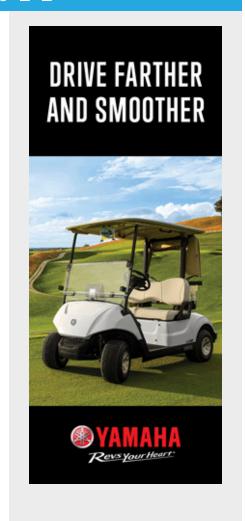

But while superheroes are singular forces, fighting the enemy tagged as the "Public Golf Endangerment Act" (or formally "AB-672 Publicly owned golf courses: conversion: affordable housing") will take thousands to kill. I wrote about this in November 2021, and I thank NGCOA for being the first national publication to publish what's identified as an existential threat to public golf. For most of the time I've been in the golf industry, political action was not a concern. If it was, it was at local levels, with things like taxes, zoning, chemical use, and maybe water rights. 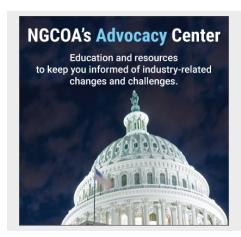
