Message from Tau Tau President

I recently participated in presenting a review course for the Certified Ambulatory Peri-Anesthesia Nurse (CAPA), and Certified Post-Anesthesia Nurse (CPAN) certifications, supported by the American Society of Peri-Anethesia Nurses (ASPAN), along with two nurse colleagues, Brittany Kauffman BSN, RN, CPAN; and Susanna Beaudin BSN, RN, CPAN. This was a unique experience since my copresenters were inexperienced presenters. Both of

these nurses are certified CPAN, and I was impressed with the professionalism they exhibited, not only during the presentations, but also throughout the time we

spent together in preparation. I was also impressed by their expert knowledge base and ability to speak to the standards of care. They demonstrated what it truly means to be a role model of the professional nurse, to other nurse colleagues and peers.

At times, I have heard nurses say "I keep my job and my personal life separate and I don't want to have anything to do with nursing after I leave work." I would challenge that statement. I believe that every nurse has a

personal investment in the profession. It starts with the basic education program, but it doesn't end there. The programs are not a "slam-dunk" by any means, and one is required to graduate, and to pass the state board exam to practice nursing. I don't believe anyone would choose to *not* be a nurse after investing that much time, energy, and resources in such an endeavor. These accomplishments are reasons to be proud and to continue advancing this time-honored profession. In the community, nurses are highly respected and trusted.

To strike a life balance, one often has other interests, such as sports, or arts, or maybe raising a family. How many people do you know who train vigorously to run a marathon? Never having been a runner, I can't relate to this but I know people who do this periodically. It seems to me that it may be torture, but it is my understanding it includes a lot of running, building stamina and endurance over time, and includes hydration and nutrition. And, my apologies for most likely

oversimplifying the process. The dedication to the marathon may be no different than nurses who are very engaged in advancing the profession by studying for a certification, or obtaining an advanced degree. In addition they serve as role models and mentors to others, are respected by their peers and are considered as resources in the clinical practice arena.



Another way of advancing the profession of nursing is to join professional nursing organizations; and every specialty in nursing seems to have one. In addition, there are other nursing organizations such as Sigma Theta Tau International which have something for all nursing interests. Tau Tau Chapter is starting off the



new fiscal year with some new board members.

These are nurses who are volunteering to advance the profession of nurses by service; they are on the board by choice. Even though another election will not occur until spring, we need to think about leadership succession. Will you be willing to serve?

Leadership Succession Planning: Opportunities for You to Serve in Tau Tau

Chapter leaders are integral volunteers within the framework of our STTI Tau Tau Chapter. Leaders guide and support a chapter ensuring that it fulfills its mission and goals. Our Leadership Succession Committee (LSC) is comprised of three elected members who are responsible for developing chapter members in organizational roles, selecting nominees for chapter leadership, preparing the election ballots, and notifying candidates of election results. Our LCS members are: Deborah Conley (Chair), Jean Adair, and Candy Rutledge.

STTI offers various resources to assist chapters in Leadership Succession Planning. One such resource is the **LEADER** Model where each letter within the model stands for one of the necessary steps in leadership succession

planning. The goal of our LCS is to use this model to help identify and develop potential candidates within our membership with unique knowledge, skills, and talents to lead Tau Tau.

- Learn: Discover which members are interested in serving in a formal leadership role.
- Educate: Help leaders educate prospective leaders about the various officer positions.
- Ask: Many members are willing to take leadership roles, but often wait for an indication that their chapter needs them to serve.
- **Develop**: After potential leaders have been elected to office, it is necessary to have a successful leadership transition.
- Empower: It is the responsibility of the outgoing chapter leaders to empower the new leadership team.

• Recognize: Recognize the unique talents and skills of the incoming chapter leaders and use these to plan for the future.

we will be reaching out to both new and experienced members who we believe have demonstrated leadership skills necessary to serve in various positions on the Tau Tau Board. 2014 Fall Program

The Tau Tau General Meeting and Fall Program took place on Monday, September 15, 2014 at Methodist College. Board members held discussion on a number of topics prior to opening up the doors for NRS220 nursing students who joined the event to listen to the invited speaker. "A U.S. Humanitarian Refugee Crisis – Unaccompanied Children on the Border" was presented by Elizabeth Furlong, PhD, JD, RN, an Associate Professor for the Center for Health Policy and Ethics at Creighton University. At the invitation of the Open Society Foundation and the Albert Schweitzer Institute, she taught Ethics with health professionals in the Republic of Georgia, Azerbaijan, and Lithuania. In 2006 she taught Community Health Nursing and Health Policy in two universities in Hungary as a Fulbright Fellow. She served a four year







appointed term on the national 21-member NIH Council of Public Representatives (COPR) and served as COPR's appointed member to the NIH Advisory Council for one and one half years - both are advisory councils to the Director of NIH.

Dr. Furlong has served on three appointed health policy task forces of the Douglas County Board of Supervisors. A former Peace Corps Volunteer in rural village South India, she has participated in Jesuit Immersion trips in the Dominican Republic and the Tribal States of NE India. She served as a consultant in nursing education in Armenia and as a Fulbright Fellow in Jordan.

The topic is very timely, and helps nurses to become more aware of the impact to our healthcare system and the legal and ethical concerns related to the current situation. The program was also very informative for the nursing students who are be-



ginning to develop their own nursing philosophy as informed by the ANA code of ethics and standards of practice. The speaker was warmly received and a brief question and answer session ended the program.

Tau Tau holds their general meetings quarterly and all members are encouraged to attend and to stay for the speakers who have presented on a number of nursing-related topics.




What well-known poet also served as a nurse during the American Civil War?

Member Recipe

Pumpkin cupcakes

15 ounces pumpkin purée

1/2 cup sugar

1/4 cup brown sugar

2 large eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

3/4 cup evaporated milk

2/3 cup all purpose flour

2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon baking soda

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line 12 cup muffin tin with silicone liners, foil liners sprayed with cooking spray or just spray the cups with cooking spray. Either of these three methods will make it easy to take the cupcake out after it's cooked. Paper liners make it difficult to remove the cupcakes.

Mix the pumpkin, sugar, brown sugar, eggs, vanilla extract and milk. Add the flour, pumpkin spice, salt, baking powder and baking soda to the mixture. Fill each muffin cup with 1/3 cup of the mixture. Bake for twenty minutes and let cool for twenty minutes.

Remove cupcakes from pan and chill in the fridge for 30 minutes. Top with whipped cream and sprinkle more pumpkin pie spice on top and serve. Makes 12 cupcakes.


