Learning Outcomes


- 1. The learner will be able to discuss how heart failure impacts patients with aortic stenosis and mitral regurgitation.


improve mobility and increase quality of life over 30 days?"

Membership

What types of Sigma membership are available to me?

There are three classifications of Membership:

- **Undergraduate Student** Junior or senior students enrolled in baccalaureate programs at accredited institutions of higher education who have completed at least 1/2 of the nursing curriculum, rank in the upper 35 percent of their graduating class and have achieved academic excellence (at schools where a 4.0 grade point average system is used, this equates to at least a 3.0)
- **Graduate Student** Master's and Doctoral students enrolled in graduate programs at accredited institutions of higher education who have completed at least 1/4 of the nursing curriculum, have achieved academic excellence (at schools where a 4.0 grade point average system is used, this equates to at least a 3.5)
- **Nurse Leader** The candidates are legally recognized to practice in their countries, have at least a baccalaureate degree in nursing or other field and demonstrate achievement in nursing.

Where does the money go?

Chapter Services Fee: Each chapter of Sigma is assessed an annual fee that helps ensure the consistent availability of high-quality resources and chapter services. The chapter services fee is based on the number of active members in each chapter and is automatically deducted from a regularly scheduled chapter renewal disbursement issued to each chapter by Sigma.

Chapter Liability Insurance: This policy provides payment in the event of a liability loss that results in injury or property damage. It protects the chapter against liabilities that arise from its daily operations, meetings, and other officially sanctioned chapter events that do not involve potentially hazardous or dangerous activities. The cost to your chapter for this insurance is based on the number of active members in your chapter as of 1 July each year and will be deducted from your September chapter disbursement.



Cauliflower Pizza Crust

Ingredients

1 medium head of cauliflower 2.5 - 3 lbs. or 5 - 6 cups of cauliflower rice Wisk the following:

1 egg - large

1 tsp Italian seasoning

1/8 tsp salt

1/4 tsp black pepper

Then add cheese and mix well

1/2 cup Parmesan or Mozzarella cheese, grated or shredded

Toppings

Anything you like, just not too heavy.

Directions

- Start with cauliflower rice, microwave for about 8 minutes. Transfer to a mesh strainer lined with cheesecloth or use a fine mesh strainer press the heck out of it with a spatula. A linen tea towel will work as well. Let it cool a bit, squeeze any additional water out.
- 2. Transfer squeezed cauliflower to a bowl. Add egg, oregano or basil, cheese, salt and pepper, and mix well.
- 3. Using your hands, flatten pizza dough on prepared baking sheet lined with parchment paper and sprayed with cooking spray.
- 4. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes. If crust is thick it may need longer cooking time which burns the edges a bit.
- 5. Flip and bake for a few more minutes until crispy.
- 6. Add pizza sauce, toppings and bake until cheese is melted. Do not overload with heavy toppings.
