# Congressional Balance of Power

## U.S. Senate

- 53-47
- New Republican majority in 119<sup>th</sup> Congress

## U.S. House of Representatives

- 219-212
- Four current vacancies
- Republican majority
- Extremely narrow margin
- Only 3 party-line votes can be lost on the floor

- Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing (1/20/25)
- Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Trust to the Federal Government (1/20/25)
- Establishing and Implementing the President's "Department of Government Efficiency" (1/20/25)
- Initial Rescissions of Harmful Executive Orders and Actions (1/20/25) – Rescinds dozens of Biden Administration Executive Orders

# Trump Administration: Adverse Effects on Public Engagement

- All BLS and BEA advisory committees



## Public Comments Halted

- February 25, HHS withdraws longstanding “Richardson Waiver” requiring notice and comments on proposed policies.

# Fiscal Year 2025 Appropriations

- H.R. 1968, the Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act of 2025 became law March 15, 2025.
- Essentially flat funds all agencies through September 30, 2025.
- No report language accompanied bill.
- Enacted recissions bill which cut \$9 billion from approved FY 2025 funds
  - Will there be more recissions bills?
- Support for releasing appropriated funds
  - 14 Senate Republicans [sent letter to OMB](#) re. release of FY 2025 NIH funding.

# Fiscal Year 2026 Appropriations

## President's FY 2026 Budget Proposes Significant Agency Restructuring:

- Reduces number of NIH Institutes and Centers from 27 to 8.
- Combines NICHD with National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders to create a National Institute for Child and Women's Health, Sensory Disorders, and Communication.
- Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality and National Center for Health Statistics moved into new HHS Office of Strategy
- Reorganizes BLS, BEA, and Census Bureau at the Department of Commerce, under the policy direction of the Under Secretary for Economic Affairs.

***PAA not opposed to agency restructuring proposals. However, these proposals should occur with input from Congress and stakeholders and as part of comprehensive authorizing legislation.***



# Fiscal Year 2026 Appropriations

To communicate FY 2026 priorities PAA has:



- Signed letters endorsing funding for all priority agencies as well as letters supporting funding for USAID, gun violence prevention research at NIH and CDC, AHRQ Health Extension Service Program, 2026 Census Test, Alzheimer's disease related research, and economic statistics activities supported by Census, BLS, and BEA.
- Signed letters or statements opposing elimination of National Survey on Drug Use and Health, cut in NIH F&A rate, funding cuts at NIH, NICHD, NIA and NINDS, NICHD reorganization, elimination of SSA Retirement and Disability Research Centers, and reductions in staffing across HHS.
- Submitted testimony to House and Senate Appropriations Committees
- Promoted [funding priorities](#) on 2025 PAA Advocacy Day.

# Fiscal Year 2026 NIH Population Research Proposed Appropriations Report Language

- Drafted and submitted to congressional champions proposed report regarding population research programs at NIA and NICHD.
- Urges sustained support for large data collection activities.
- [Similar to language included in FY 2025 House and Senate LHHS reports.](#)
- Rep. Debbie Dingell (D-MI-6) and Rep. Paul Tonko (D-NY-20) signed “Dear Colleague” letter in support of NIA and NICHD population report language.

# **Resolution: Urge Federal Support for Population Sciences**

**We urge Congress and the Administration to:**

**Support robust funding for the National Institutes of Health, National Science Foundation, U.S. Census Bureau and all federal statistical agencies.**

**Restore funding for rescinded federal research grants and contracts and respect agencies' rigorous vetting and peer-review processes.**

**Protect the integrity of federal data by restoring missing data and data products and taking steps to prevent future removal of taxpayer- funded data products, documentation, and websites.**

**Reconstitute terminated federal agency advisory committees.**

**Reestablish the public's ability to comment on proposed federal policies, rules, agency reorganization proposals, and regulations.**

**Strengthen federal scientific and statistical agencies' workforces and restore agency staffing levels.**

**Reinstate federal agencies that were terminated without appropriate congressional input and oversight.**

# Disappearing Federal Data and Websites

In response to January 2025 removal of Federal data, data products, and websites, PAA took following actions:

- **Spearheaded letter to Congress** signed by 230 national, state, and local organizations and 2,600 individuals representing data users, nationwide urging the restoration of taxpayer financed data removed from federal agency websites.
- **Issued PAA action alert** that generated 455 messages to members of Congress.
- **Issued press release and provided and/or arranged background interviews** to reporters at Politico, New York Times, Associated Press, and National Public Radio.
- **Sponsored two briefings at request of GAO** on disappearing federal data.
- **Responded to congressional inquiries** from oversight and funding committee staff in House and Senate.

# Award Terminations



- Established [portal for members](#) to submit award terminations.
- Shared examples of canceled awards with congressional staff.
- Arranged interviews for members as requested by congressional staff.
- Joined almost 50 other leading science organizations in [signing open letter that was published in The Chronicle of Higher Education](#).

# Termination of SSA Retirement and Disability Research Consortium

In response to [February 25 decision issued by the Social Security Administration](#) to terminate the Retirement and Disability Research Consortium (RDRC) cooperative agreements, PAA:

- [Organized letter to Congress and Administration](#) that was signed by almost 20 national, state, and local organizations and over 400 individuals nationwide, urging the restoration of the RDRC program.
- **Issued action alert** that generated over **50 messages** to Congress.
- **Organized meetings** for Bill Beach, former BLS Commissioner, and Wendell Primus, Former Senior Advisor to Speaker Pelosi, with staff on House Ways and Means and Senate Finance Committees.
- Included as a top PAA FY 2026 appropriations priority.



# Some Good News: Outreach Works!

- Increased amount for nondefense funding in FY 2025 House appropriations allocations
- Increased proposed funding for NSF in FY 2026 Senate and House marks
- Increased funding for Census Bureau in President's FY 2026 budget request.
- Supportive language re ACS and 2026 Census Test and advisory committees in Senate FY 2026 CJS appropriations report
- 14 Republican Senators sent OMB Director letter urging release of FY 2025 NIH funding.
- Restoration of hate crimes question in National Crimes Victimization Survey.
- "Improving Population Health" one of NIH Director Jay Bhattacharya top priorities
