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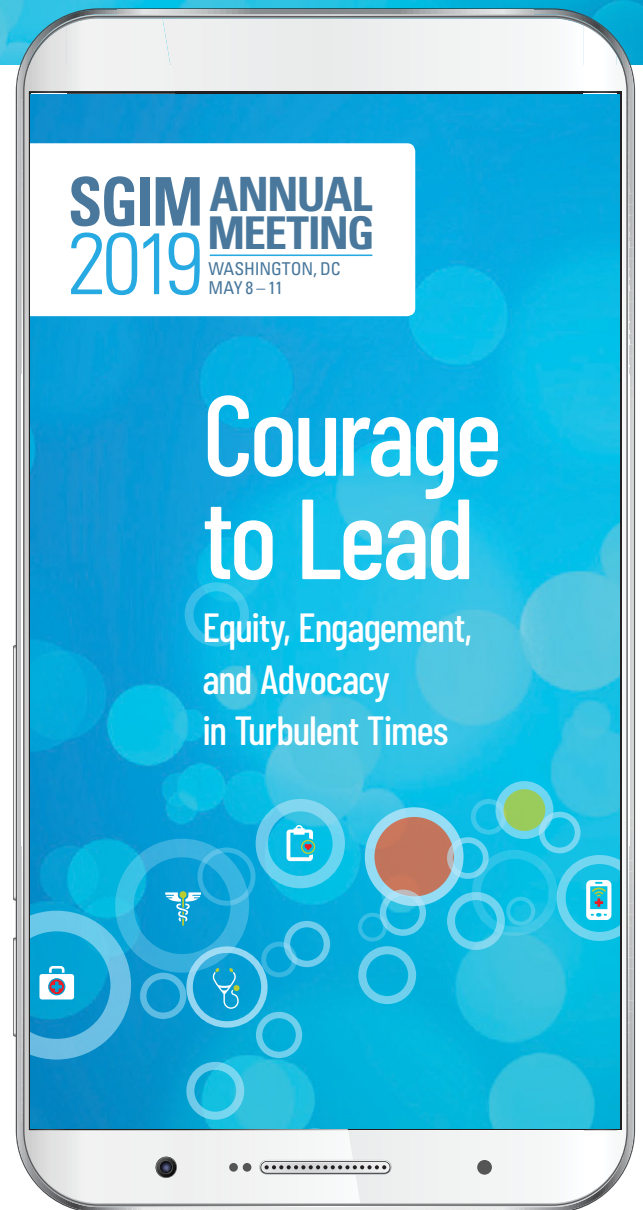

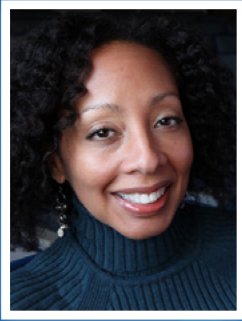

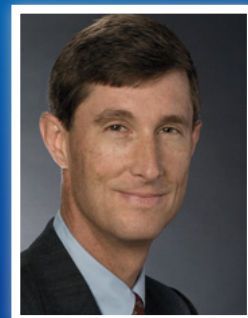

**Health Equity: The Race for the Sure**

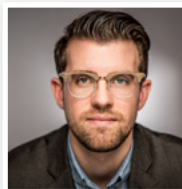

Giselle Corbie-Smith, MD, MSc, is Professor of Social Medicine and Medicine at the School of Medicine, and nationally recognized for her scholarly work on the practical and ethical issues regarding involvement of minorities in research. Continuously funded over the last 20 years by the National Institutes of Health, her empirical work has focused on the methodological, ethical, and practical issues faced by mandated inclusion of minorities in research and the need for this research to address disparities in health. In all of her studies, she has built multidisciplinary research teams to conduct research that advances health equity. In collaboration with community partners, she has developed and tested intervention across systems to address the health needs of vulnerable populations with the goal of eliminating health disparities, while providing support and mentoring to pre-doctoral, post-doctoral, and junior faculty trainees. She has used engaged research methods, like community-based participatory research, to work collaboratively with communities to address the issues of most concern. She has received multiple awards for her pioneering work in engaged research and was recently elected to the National Academy of Medicine in recognition for her scientific contributions to medicine and public health.

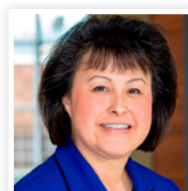


### **Sustaining a Note**

**Carl G. Streed, Jr., MD, MPH**

*Assistant Professor, Department of Medicine, General Internal Medicine, Boston University School of Medicine*

Carl G. Streed, Jr., MD, MPH, is an Assistant Professor of Medicine in the Section of General Internal Medicine at Boston University School of Medicine and physician in the Center for Transgender Medicine and Surgery at Boston Medical Center. He earned his medical degree from Johns Hopkins, where he advocated for the inclusion of LGBTQ health in the curricula of the Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health; increased the visibility and value of the LGBTQ community through community advocacy; and achieved transgender equity in health insurance coverage. He completed fellowship in general internal medicine at Brigham and Women's Hospital where his research focused on the health and well-being of sexual and gender minorities, particularly transgender and gender non-conforming individuals. Dr. Streed's efforts to improve the health and well-being of LGBTQ individuals and communities have earned him the Johns Hopkins Diversity Leadership Award, the American Medical Student Association James Slayton National Award for Leadership Excellence, AMA Foundation Excellence in Medicine Award, and the Erickson-Zoellers Point Foundation Scholarship as well as recognition from the World Professional Association for Transgender Health and the Obama White House.



### **American Indian Healthcare: Trying to Heal a Broken Promise**

*Director, Policy Research Center, National Congress of American Indians*

Yvette Roubideaux, MD, MPH (Rosebud Sioux/ Standing Rock Sioux), is the Director of the NCAI Policy Research Center, whose mission is to provide tribal leaders with the best available knowledge to make strategically proactive policy decisions in a framework of Native wisdom that positively impact the future of Native peoples. She is an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Health Systems, Management, and Policy in the Colorado School of Public Health at the University of Colorado. Previously she served as Clinical Professor and Associate Dean for Diversity, Inclusion and Leadership at the Elson S. Floyd College of Medicine at Washington State University and Assistant Professor at the University of Arizona College of Medicine and Zuckerman College of Public Health. Her prior work includes research, education, health systems administration, and policy development in the areas of American Indian/Alaska Native health and the quality of diabetes care. Dr. Roubideaux received her undergraduate, medical, and public health degrees at Harvard, is the author of several peer-reviewed research publications, and co-edited the 2001 book *Promises to Keep: Public Health Policy for American Indians and Alaska Natives*.

### 2019 Malcolm L. Peterson Honor Lecture

#### *Tools to Inspire Anti-Racism in Action*



**Camara Jones, MD, MPH, PhD**

*Past President of the American Public Health Association (2015-2016); Senior Fellow at the Satcher Health Leadership Institute and the Cardiovascular Research Institute at the Morehouse School of Medicine*

Camara Phyllis Jones, MD, MPH, PhD, is a Past President of the American Public Health Association (2015-2016) and a Senior Fellow at the Satcher Health Leadership Institute and the Cardiovascular Research Institute at the Morehouse School of Medicine.

Dr. Jones is a family physician and epidemiologist whose work focuses on naming, measuring, and addressing the impacts of racism on the health and well-being of the nation. She seeks to broaden the national health debate to include not only universal access to high-quality healthcare, but also attention to the social determinants of health (including poverty) and the social determinants of equity (including racism).

Dr. Jones is a public health leader valued for her creativity and intellectual agility. As a methodologist, she has developed new methods for comparing full distributions of data, rather than simply comparing means or proportions, in order to investigate population-level risk factors and propose population-level interventions. As a social epidemiologist, her work on “race”-associated differences in health outcomes goes beyond simply documenting those differences to vigorously investigating the structural causes of the differences. As a teacher, her allegories on “race” and racism illuminate topics that are otherwise difficult for many Americans to understand or discuss. She aims through her work to catalyze a national conversation on racism that will mobilize and engage all Americans in a National Campaign Against Racism.

Dr. Jones was an Assistant Professor at the Harvard School of Public Health (1994-2000) before being recruited to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (2000-2014), where she served as a Medical Officer and Research Director on Social Determinants of Health and Equity. Highly valued as a mentor and teacher, she is currently an Adjunct Professor at the Rollins School of Public Health at Emory University and an Adjunct Associate Professor at the Morehouse School of Medicine.

She is also actively sought as a contributor to national efforts to eliminate health disparities and achieve health equity, including her current role as a faculty member of the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education's Pursuing Excellence in the Clinical Learning Environment collaborative addressing Health Care Disparities, and her former role as a Project Advisor and on-screen expert for the groundbreaking film series *Unnatural Causes: Is Inequality Making Us Sick?*

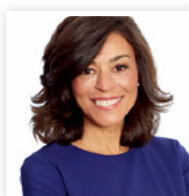
Dr. Jones earned her BA in Molecular Biology from Wellesley College, her MD from the Stanford University School of Medicine, and both her Master of Public Health and her PhD in Epidemiology from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health. She also completed residency training in General Preventive Medicine at Johns Hopkins and in Family Practice at the Residency Program in Social Medicine at Montefiore Medical Center.

Sonia Angell, MD, MPH, received her medical degree from the University of California San

Francisco and completed residency at Brigham and Women's Hospital. She is a former Robert Wood Johnson Clinical Scholar. She has a Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene from the London School, and a Master's in Public Health from the University of Michigan. She is currently Deputy Commissioner at the NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene overseeing the Division of Prevention and Primary Care. This division implements solutions to reduce individual and systemic barriers to equitable population health through the advancement of chronic disease prevention strategies and with a focus on primary care information technologies and clinical quality improvements. Approaches emphasize the integration of traditional public health and clinical care systems. Previously she was Senior Advisor for Global Noncommunicable Diseases at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and directed the Cardiovascular Disease Program at the NYC Health Department.
