#### 5. Chair-elect report – John Kromer

Good to see everyone at the First Night Dinner, especially the first time attendees.

He is the 2019 Conference Planner. The conference will take place in Cleveland, OH. June 14-18.

The SLA Leadership Symposium will once again take place in New Orleans in January 2019. The exact dates have not been set. There were six PAM attendees at the 2018 Symposium.

If anyone has and ideas for sessions, let John know. The deadline for session submissions will be in October, there will probably be an August deadline also. As in past years' PAM will have three roundtables and the Vendor update. Contact John with ideas for educational sessions.

#### 6. Chair report – Laura Palumbo

Want to acknowledge and thank Cambridge University Press as sponsors, EDP Sciences for implementing a new International Travel Stipend, and APS & SIAM for sponsoring the business meeting breakfast.

#### 7. SLA News

There are approximately 1700 attendees at SLA 2018. There were approximately 1500 in Phoenix.

The 1700 does include attendees for the Pharmaceutical & Health Technology Division Annual meeting.

There are 132 exhibitors, same as last year.

SLA membership is 4,202 in April, down from 5,345 in 2017. There are 114 PAM members.

Good news: 81 PAM members registered for the conference, which is 71% of our membership.

PAM is continuing to choose Option 1. We have our own fundraising committee and our vendors choose to work closely with our division.

Websites, including SLA's and many units', were hacked earlier this year. This problem has been rectified. Next year, the association will have a new web platform, the same system used for Connect, from the company Higher Logic. Currently PAM pays \$50.00 a month for our website — that price may increase with the move to the new platform.

SLA has updated its recommended practices for units. There were changes made to methods of voting, and the number of people needed for a quorum. Will keep you updated on changes as they occur. We will need to amend our Governing Documents to be in accordance.

## **Astronomy Roundtable**

## Donna Thompson and Kelly Durkin Ruth

This year's Astronomy Roundtable in Baltimore was themed "The Librarian's Guide to the Stars" and included featured speakers, group discussion and a lively Q&A session.

Our first presenter was Jenny Novacescu, the chief librarian at the Space Telescope Science Institute in Baltimore. She spoke about the history and current status of the <u>Unified Astronomy Thesaurus</u>, an open, community-supported thesaurus which unifies existing astronomy and astrophysics terminology into a single source.

Next spoke Josh Peek, an associate astronomer and Data Science Mission Office project scientist at the Space Telescope Science Institute, as well as principal investigator of the Mikulski Institute for Space Archives (MAST). He presented on the MAST DOI Initiative, a system for assigning and preserving DOIs for MAST Data cited in AAS journals.

Attendees were given a list of topics to discuss with their colleagues in small groups. The moderators then opened the conversation up to the full audience with participants asking questions to the presenters and to each other.

Donna Thompson, co-moderator and librarian at the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics, updated the audience on updates to the new Astrophysics Data System interface and the eventual retirement of ADS Classic.

## **Physics Roundtable**

Therese Triumph, Sara Tompson, and Social Media Science Communicators

The 2018 Physics Roundtable was entitled "Let's get the story straight: How to Communicate Science Effectively," and featured two scientists, and one science communicator speaking, and the participants trying their own hands at tweets or blog posts on the scientists talks.

- •Dr. Joel Green, (@groog1), Project Scientist in the Office of Public Outreach at the Space Telescope Science Institute, deliberately made his brief talk on how stars form fairly technical, as he'd speak to other scientists, he said (though our savvy PAM members likely grasped much of it).
- •Dr. Katie Mack, theoretical astrophysicist and Assistant Professor of Physics at North Carolina State University, (and well known as @astrokatie) spoke briefly and humorously on possible scenarios for the death of our universe.
- •Natasha Metzler, Science Writer for the Carnegie Institution for Science, (@DCScienceFan), gave us tips for communicating scientific points to lay audiences.

All three speakers then roamed the room to help participants craft tweets or brief summaries on the talks. A number of the 60+ session participants willingly shared their writings with the whole group. PAM Bulletin Editor Kayleigh Bohémier set up a Google doc where any of the participants could post their writing, and quite a few did.

### Math Roundtable

#### **Jennifer Hart & Carol Hutchins**

At the Roundtable this year, Norman Richert from Mathematical Reviews spoke about the changes being made to the mathematical subject classifications in Mathematical Reviews.

Mathematical Reviews and ZBMath have launched a cooperative effort to revise the subject classification. They are soliciting opinions and presently welcome comments on the process: <a href="https://msc2020.org/">https://msc2020.org/</a>.

We also had a plenary discussion that covered multiple topics of interest. We discussed outreach to our communities and what practices worked best, mathematics departments' relationship to data science on our campuses and how we handled new journal subscriptions when faced with budget constraints.

## Report of the Awards Presentation

#### **PAM Awards Committee**

The PAM Awards Committee want to take this opportunity to recognize this year's SLA and PAM Award winners.

#### SLA Awards within the PAM Division:

#### PAM Achievement Award:

The PAM Achievement Award is reserved for those recipients whose professional work is marked by distinction and dedication to librarianship in astronomy, mathematics and/or physics and who have made outstanding contributions to the Division. The Awards Committee is pleased to present this year's award to Thurston Miller.

Thurston joined SLA and PAM in 1993, and has been actively involved in PAM in a variety of capacities from the beginning. Starting in 1994, Thurston served three consecutive years as the PAM Bulletin Editor. Thurston served as PAM Hospitality Chair for the 1998 SLA Annual Conference in Indianapolis. In

2001, Thurston served as moderator for the PAM Physics Roundtable. From 1998-2000, Thurston served as the PAM vendor liaison between PAM and INSPEC. In 2002, Thurston served as Assistant Bulletin Editor. Starting in 2007, Thurston served as the PAM vendor liaison between PAM and Turpion.

Even with these many accomplishments, the Awards Committee wishes most of all to recognize Thurston for his long tenure as PAMnet Owner. Starting in 2005, and continuing until the handoff of PAMnet between the University of Notre Dame and the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in August 2016, Thurston's 11 year contribution is a strong display of dedication to physics, astronomy, and mathematics librarianship and to the PAM Division. PAMnet is an incredibly important resource for PAM and the entire field.

At his home institution at Notre Dame, Thurston is the Chemistry and Physics Librarian. Thurston has worked at Notre Dame for over 25 years. Faculty in the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry and the Department of Physics describe him as a highly knowledgeable colleague who routinely goes well beyond the call of duty to collaborate with them on their research endeavors. In 2017, Thurston was honored with the Rev. Paul J. Foik Award, which is "given annually to a library faculty member who has contributed significantly to library service to the Notre Dame community or to the library profession through personal scholarship or involvement in professional associations." He was nominated for the Foik award by Notre Dame students in the chemistry seminar class that he teaches each year.

Thurston has achieved much during his time in PAM and with his home institution. His contributions have been consistently outstanding. Congratulations, Thurston!

PAM Division Award: The NASA Astrophysics Data System AKA ADS

While the germ of ADS began in 1988, it was not until early 1993 that ADS was openly available. By 1998, ADS had 1 Million Abstracts, with 7.2 Million in 2008, and 13 Million by 2017. At something north of 300,000 users a month, the small ADS staff has its

hands full loading new records, updating records and citations, and keeping its broad user base happy. How broad is the ADS user base? The disparate groups range from bibliographers (some of the WORST!) to scientists, with Publishers, Librarians, and Programmers keeping the mix varied and interesting.

This, however, only 'ADS-up' to the productivity of ADS — it does not address its usefulness and responsiveness to the physics and astronomy communities it supports with little fanfare and no advertising. How responsive is ADS? ADS is so responsive they have received flowers and cupcakes – more than once – from their users; how many of us can say that? They are an integral part of the astronomy community and work closely with the AAS, SIMBAD, arXiv, and InSpire, and work with at least 50 different publishers. ADS does all of this while also working with the community they serve by hosting workshops and unique conferences with bibliographers, publishers, and society organizations, hosting PhD students in information science, completing usability studies with library science classes, and hosting publishing and provider summits. Their most recent community outreach was a hacking session!

ADS is not only an outstanding provider of information but an integral and involved part of the physics and astronomy communities and those of us in these communities are richer – and spoiled – due their tireless efforts. ADS has earned, through hard work and attention to their user base, the PAM Division Award.

Just more proof of the vibrancy of the PAM Division. Congratulations, Elizabeth (Beth), Anya, Heidi, Thurston, and ADS!
