It was a privilege to work with a team that really went above and beyond to deliver for MLC members and MLTW attendees.

Although I no longer work at a military library, I am still involved in MLC. I value the personal and professional connections that I have made there. I firmly believe my MLC volunteer experiences helped prepare me for my current position.
