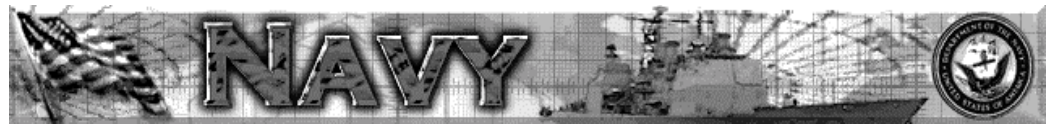

News From the Dudley Knox Library, Naval Postgraduate School

The Naval Postgraduate School's Dudley Knox Library recently launched our first web-based library orientation. The project was a collaborative effort with the School's Office of Continuous Learning, which funded the contractor who worked with DKL's Research and Instruction Librarians to develop it.

The online orientation provides an overview to the Library's resources, services and facility, as well as an introduction to basic information seeking and searching skills. Designed to meet the needs of both resident and distance students, the Orientation is available to the NPS community in Blackboard and to the general public or NPS users without Blackboard accounts on the Library's web site at

<http://library.nps.navy.mil/home/orientlaunch.htm>.

On 6 January, NPS launched the nation's first curriculum in Homeland Defense and Security, enrolling 14 students who already serve in significant homeland security-related positions. In September an additional 40 students began the program. The need for this program was identified by its two sponsors, the Department of Homeland Security's Office for Domestic Preparedness and the United States Navy. These sponsors found that, despite the emergence of terrorism as a dire challenge to national security, no graduate-level program yet existed to develop the next generation of leadership to deal with that threat.

The program is structured to help strengthen US capacity to prevent, deter, and respond to terrorist attacks, and to build the interagency and civil-military cooperation that defeating

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Teamwork Solves Navy Marine Corps Intranet Issue

When the NMCI network concept first started being discussed, folks in the NAVAIR WD Technical Library at China Lake knew they were going to have a problem. The library subscribes to hundreds of electronic resources that are accessible to China Lake and Point Mugu personnel at their workstation via internet protocol (IP) recognition technology. Technical Library Director Sandy Bradley explains, "With the legacy network, we had a firewall at each site we serve, one at China Lake and another at Point Mugu. Our vendors could verify a computer was physically at one of those two sites by checking the IP of the firewall. With NMCI, we have a number of firewalls and switch points – there isn't any way to predict or

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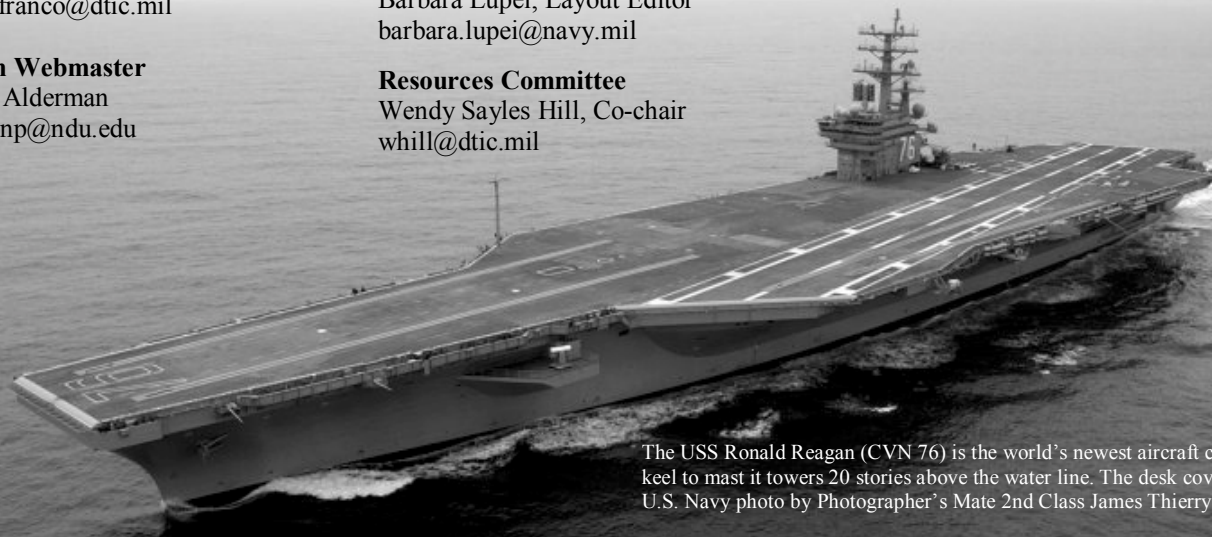

specify which firewall our users will be routed through. Asking the vendors to allow NMCI IP recognition wasn't acceptable because it would open access to *everyone* on the NMCI network – which will eventually include the entire Navy. This represented a major problem for us. As the NMCI workstations replaced the old legacy computers, library customers found they could not access all of the electronic resources they have come to rely on. We started hearing from them – and their complaints were legitimate.”



A small team consisting of Bob Bloudek of the Technical Library, James Furnish from the NMCI Information Strike Force, Larry Jenkins and Jeff Thatcher of the Information Technology/ Information Management Department, set off seeking solutions. “Since NAVAIR was one of the first Navy organizations to implement NMCI, we didn't have anyone else we could turn to and see how they handled the problem,” explains Bloudek, “Now we have other Navy libraries calling us for assistance with their NMCI issues. We were able to get a lot of help from the Library at the Naval Post Graduate School – especially from Lillian Gasie who is their information systems manager. Students at NPS are able to connect to the library's web sites from home though a proxy server.” With that in mind, the team began exploring the possibility of using similar technology to solve the China Lake/Point Mugu access problems.

“The team was great to work with,” continued Bloudek, “Larry and Jeff knew the computer technology, James is an expert with the NMCI network, and Lillian was willing to share her experiences in setting up a proxy server. Everything just seemed to fall into place.”

The team was able to secure storage space on a NAVAIR computer located in the “DMZ” – outside both the legacy and NMCI firewalls. A copy of EZ-Proxy, a software program written especially for libraries, was provided by the author for evaluation. After what Bloudek calls “a little

blood, sweat, and tears” the software was installed and configured specifically to work with NMCI's security requirements. The first attempts at testing weren't successful – neither were the second, third and fourth. “We just kept working away,” said Jenkins. “We'd reconfigure the software and then we'd test again – finally it was successful!”

The proxy server and software now enable NMCI users at China Lake and Point Mugu to access the valuable electronic periodicals and databases available via the library website located at <http://www.nawcwpns.navy.mil/~tlibrary/>.

“The technology is pretty simple,” explained Bloudek. “When an NMCI user clicks on a link, data goes from his workstation to an NMCI switch point (in San Diego, Hawaii or Norfolk) back to the proxy server at China Lake and prompts him for a username and password. When that data is entered, the proxy server directs the user to the proper website. Authorization is based on both the IP of the proxy server and the username/password. A legacy user can click on the same link and the proxy server has been programmed to recognize the user is from NAVAIR WD and simply passes him through and on to the vendor's website. Now that we can access these sites from our NMCI workstations, we won't have to maintain as many legacy computers. Many offices kept their legacy computer when NMCI rolled out because they needed access to the library resources. They didn't have that access with NMCI until our proxy server was implemented, but they have it now.”

Bloudek concluded by saying, “This is a temporary fix to what was a serious problem for us. We will have to continue working related issues as they come up. terrorism requires.

A vital component of the NPS program is the development of the Homeland Security Digital Library, developed by members of the Library staff and contractors from the Military Personnel Service Corporation. Maxine Reneker is the Principal Investigator on the grant, Lillian Woon Gassie is Project Manager and Taxonomy Development Team leader, Layne Williams is Administrative Team Leader, and Greta Marlatt is Content Development and Copyright Team Leader.

The prototype of the HSDL was launched in September and is now available for use by NPS students and faculty. It contains a digital archive of over 7000 items, a single search across over 100 licensed databases, and targeted news feeds, searches, and documents of interest in each of 46 specific topics areas. The prototype is expected to solicit significant user feedback to generate improvements in the product before the first release in February 2004.

With end of the year funds, the Library was able to purchase Social Science Citation Index with back files to 2000 and Current Contents in 4 subject areas. The Library also completed a major revision and update to a bibliography of current interest, Chemical, Biological, and Nuclear Terrorism/Warfare: a Bibliography, posted at <http://library.nps.navy.mil/home/bibs/chemtoc.htm>.

The Library has been undergoing major construction to install a sprinkler system on all three decks in the original part of the Library. The stacks are all covered in plastic. Starting in October many of the computer workstations on the first deck and the reference desk will need to be relocated; the construction is scheduled to be completed in December. □

A Member Passes

John "Jack" Thompson, a member of the Military Librarians Division of the Special Libraries Association since 1965, died October 27th in Adamstown Maryland. Mr. Thompson served in the U.S. Army during World War II and the Korean War. Following World War II, he received a degree in Library Science from Western Reserve University. In addition to being a librarian at Indiana University, he worked as an Information Specialist at National Security Agency from 1956 to 1979. Mr. Thompson was interred at Arlington National Cemetery.
