LEARNING ACTIVITIES AT THE SMC

DAY 1:

The Greek representatives arrived at Hyatt Regency on the 1st of November 2016 and registered for the convention, checking in their volunteer schedule and spending time socializing with students from other SNAME student and parent sections.

On Wednesday 2/11 the official SMC activities began along with the student program. The two officers of our student committee <u>Alexandros Senteris</u> and <u>Lydia Kougioumoutzaki</u> volunteered more than once as **assistant moderators** in presentations of papers at the conference.

The highlight of the day was the **student design competition,** where students from several SNAME

Sections worldwide mixed and teamed up in create a small boat made of simple everyday materials given to them by the organizers. The race challenge had two rounds. Almost 120 students participated forming 12 teams.

Our vice-chairwoman Christina Toki, and three other SNAME-NTUA student members Polina Liadi, Vassiliki Mourkokosta and Sotiria Lagouvardou won the second place with their team in the student design competition competing in terms of vessel speed and damage stability condition. Their team designed a catamaran-like boat with a paddle wheel propulsion system, all of which was made of plastic bottles, cardboard box, wooden sticks and a glue gun as their "welding equipment".

Later on, a student social event was organized giving us the time to get to know with other students and future partners.



DAY 2:

The day started with a Topical Breakfast, where a topic is presented after or during the breakfast by usually an acknowledged professional. Then we focused on the technical program and attended several presentations based on our own interests. Later that day we had time to visit the Expo that

was organized for the convention where many companies presented their ideas, projects and products.



Exhibitors described in detail their patents and new equipment that aimed to solve the problems of today's maritime industry.

The student program that day consisted of a student Job, Scholarship and Graduate School Fair. An event mostly adressed to students interested in internships in the US. It was undoubtedly beneficial for us to know what qualifications are required by the international labor market. Also a Student Industry Roundtable Session was held on the same day, where students had the opportunity to discuss with professionals and SNAME officers about several topics based on their interests. At the evening we attended the Annual SNAME Banquet.





DAY 3:

The third day also started with a Topical Breakfast followed by the student Microsite competition and the SSC elections. At the end of the day we all attended the **Awards Luncheon** which was the closing event for the day. It is important to underline that the presentation given by Greek professional, Mr Papanikolaou demonstrating the global aspect of our society and

the essential presence of Greeks in such a society, That day was notable for our section as, not only was the Greek section honored as a Super Section for another consecutive year but our chairman, Alexandros Senteris, was awarded an Undergraduate Scholarship award. Furthermore, our student members were awarded and earned cash prizes while an award was also given to our former professor Mr Papanikolaou as SNAME faculty advisor.

After the Awards ceremony we said our farewells with our friends hoping to meet them again and thanked all those who helped organize such a great conference and all those who helped participate in it.

PARTICIPATION OF SNAME-NTUA IN POSIDONIA 2016, THE INTERNATIONAL SHIPPING EXHIBITION

Posidonia is a major exhibition for the global shipping industry. It takes place every other year in Athens, Greece and has proven to be the place for serious business as the largest gathering in the shipping calendar. This year's Posidonia fair was held in Metropolitan Expo Center from Monday 6/06/2016 up to Friday 10/06/2016 and for the fifth time SNAME participated with its own stand, 2'435/5 at Hall 2.

SNAME's president elect Joe Comer and SNAME's Executive Director Erik Seither attended the Posidonia Exhibition and were on hand at the SNAME stand. The prime Minister of Greece, Alexis Tsipras, the US Ambassador in Athens and the US Maritime Administrator visited the SNAME stand as well as many people from all around the world.

During the exhibition around 25 new member registrations were made, while more than 25 publications were ordered.

All the arrangements and preparations for the SNAME stand were made by SNAME's European Regional Office (SERO) and the stand set up was carried out with the help of NTUA and TEI student members. In total 25 volunteer SNAME NTUA, TEI and UOS (University of Strathclyde) student members attended the stand in three shifts.

During the Posidonia week a number of networking events are organised such as the Posidonia Cup Sailing Race in Faliron Bay, Piraeus and many learning and social activities were added to the SNAME events agenda.

Mentors shared their experience with students, imparted their knowledge, paid a visit to booths of their choice and answered questions. Each session lasted up to 2 hours and with the SNAME stand as the starting line.

George Rossopoulos:

"As a SNAME student member I participated in MFD program during the latest Posidonia Exhibition in 2016 and I wish I could do this again in the next Posidonia. It was exceptional initiative bridging the gap between students and professionals. As a student you apart from meeting a very interesting experienced professional, you get the chance to meet, through

them, several other professionals around the exhibition as well. You also get the chance to discuss about the most "hot" topics in the market and view the solutions proposed either the professionals from escorting you or from exhibitors. several My personal experience was to follow two superintendents and we discussed about the news of the marked today, which companies seem to be the main drivers for each sector (or rather which ones do they trust more). Our group consisted of 5 students and 2 professionals and we walked together in 3 expo halls spending more than 3-4 hours receiving mentoring. It was a great opportunity to meet other students from the Strathclyde University and the TEI of Athens. In more detail, we spent a lot of time visiting booths of navigation companies offering representation maps, route analysis, route calculation and optimization. Furthermore we visited the major Shipyard booths from Korea and China and later we visited other companies presenting several systems from ballast treatment and mooring devices to life saving equipment. Personally I think it was a great experience that all students should try to get at least once. Last but not least note that meeting all these professionals is essential for our future as well since the **NAME** community relatively small and sooner or later we ourselves will be working together or for such professionals."

' I would like first of all to thank you for the opportunity you gave me in order to participate in Posidonia and particularly in this program. "Mentor for a day" program was a great initiative and offered many things to all of us. Personally speaking, it gave me the opportunity to get in touch with maritime professionals and hear their advices first hand. Council Retreat 2016

This year's SNAME's Council Retreat was held in Virginia from the 10th until the 12th of June. The purpose of this annual event is to introduce to the new Section Chairs their responsibilities and the mode of operation of the society but also to get to know each other and to establish paths of cooperation and the importance of partnership.

FIRST DAY:

During the first day, we visited the National Museum of the United States Navy in Washington where we had the chance to see numerous exhibits dating back to the American Revolution. Later on, Ms. Robin White, the Director of Surface Ship Design and Systems Engineering at Naval Sea Systems Command informed us about the work and responsibilities of her department. When we returned at the hotel, the presentations of the first day started, mainly focused on membership and the structure of the Society.





SECOND DAY:

The second day started with presentations early in the morning that brought into focus the different types of services that SNAME provide and the ways that the members could make full use of them. The presentations continued with the "Faces of SNAME" during which, various members such as students, young professionals, educators, professionals, operators and manufacturers gave a short speech describing what SNAME has provided them so far and what more they expect. In the evening, we were grouped in teams of 8 and we were asked to design and built a vessel and its accompanying propulsion system out of plastic bottles, cardboard and tape. The vessel had to carry the cargo of two soda cans and was going to be tested during normal and damaged stability conditions.





LAST DAY: The last day of the conference, also started with presentations and was followed by a discussions regarding the weaknesses of the society, how we can eliminate them and what strategy we should follow in order to help our Section prosper. The last event was of course the so anticipated vessel design competition that was carried out in a plastic pool. Everybody was cheering and you could really feel the enthusiasm. Best part; my team actually came second!

To conclude, if I had to choose one word to describe the best thing about this event, that would be socialization. During the various meals, the members where put in different tables with different people every time and in that way we got to know each other really fast. Everybody was friendly and social, no matter the age or the profession. I had the chance to meet great people from all around the world and discuss with them about matters of the Society but also of the industry and of the education provided. I believe that this kind of communication is actually the core of SNAME because at the end of the day, this what our job is going to be about; meeting different people from all around the world and cooperate with them in order to achieve our goals together!
