Wednesday 12-1pm	Native Knowledge 360: New Perspectives on Native American History and Culture	Edwin Schupman, Colleen Call Smith (Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian)	How can we tell the stories of Native Americans? Join the National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI) to learn about and strategize how to build more complete learning experiences for students and teachers about Native Americans. Using key concepts from the Native Knowledge 360° Essential Understandings about American Indians as a benchmark, participants will consider how their state currently approaches teaching and learning about Native Americans. Then, working with NMAI education staff, participants will brainstorm ways to build upon and improve student learning experiences about the rich and diverse cultures, histories, and contemporary lives of Native Peoples.

Thursday 12-1pm	Making Gay History	Eric Marcus (Making Gay History Podcast)	How can our history include LGBTQ perspectives? The work at Making Gay History brings LGBTQ history to life through the voices of the people who lived it – creating podcasts and documentaries, sourcing and licensing archival materials, producing events, and developing LGBTQ-inclusive educational resources.
Thursday 1:30-2:30pm	Economics of the Pandemic	Amy Hennessey, Princeton Williams (Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta)	How has COVID-19 affected the U.S. economy? The COVID-19 pandemic has had a profound effect on the U.S. economy. From employment to consumer spending, housing and student loans, business and work norms, schools and childcare facilities, travel and tourism; this crisis has touched every facet of American life. This session will explore the economic response by the fiscal and monetary authorities. Join Amy Hennessey and Princeton Williams, education specialists from the Atlanta Fed, as they examine the response, the historical context, and the associated economic data. Learn how to share this information with your teachers using a FRED dashboard that includes graphs of relevant data.
Thursday 2:30-3:30pm	CS4 Member Coffee Talk	Joy Hatcher (GA Dept. of Education) Fran O'Malley (University of Delaware)	What can we learn from each other? In this session, participants will break into Zoom rooms for smaller group discussions of topics selected in the previous day of current interest to our members (e.g., virtual/remote learning, standards revision, etc.). Participants will also hear a quick update about how they can connect during the year through member in the Council of Chief State School Officer's (CCSSO) Social Studies State Collaborative Group.
Thursday 4:00-5:00pm	Teaching Civic Online Reasoning: Empowering Students to Sort Fact from Fiction Online	Sarah McGrew (University of Maryland, College Park)	How do we combat misinformation? Perhaps now more than ever, as we are bombarded by misinformation and students spend more time online, schools and teachers should help students learn to effectively evaluate online information. This workshop will focus on a research-based approach to teaching students to evaluate social and political content online: civic online reasoning. Participants will engage with research from the Stanford



			History Education Group to introduce civic online reasoning, what we've learned about what works when teaching online reasoning, and consider how states and districts can support teachers to teach these vital democratic skills.
