What is the difference between supervision, peer supervision, and mentoring?

Supervision, peer supervision, and mentoring are sometimes confused with one another. You should determine which partnership is best suited to support you. You might engage in more than one partnership to meet different support needs. Organisations define supervision, peer supervision and mentoring differently. The following similarities and differences are defined for speech pathologists in SPA's Professional Standards (2020a) and Position Statement: Professional Support, Supervision and Mentoring (2022).
