


2019 Funding Overview



2019 Outlays





Roughly 84 percent of outlays, about \$117 billion, are for mandatory programs – providing services required by laws other than annual appropriations acts. These outlays include crop insurance, nutrition assistance programs, farm commodity and trade programs, and a number of conservation programs.

The remaining 16 percent of outlays, about \$23 billion, are associated with discretionary programs such as WIC; food safety; rural development loans and grants; research and education; soil and water conservation technical assistance; animal and plant health; management of national forests, wildland fire, and other Forest Service activities; and domestic and international marketing assistance.



- Transformative projects
- Application process See AFRI Foundational Program RFA Key points: Research Standard Grants only, \$100K and 2 year max, Letter of Intent necessary, Applications due 60 days after full proposal submission




AFRI - Things to remember

 - Max project length
 - Project type
 - Grant types
 - Letter of intent requirements
 - Application deadline
 - Program contact information

It looks like you are applying for an AFRI.

Don't forget that the max budget includes indirect costs



SBIR Program

Determine the scientific or technical feasibility of ideas

Awards may not exceed \$100K and "normally" do not exceed 8 months

Promote principal R/R&D and the potential to commercialize the innovation

Stimulate technological innovation and the national return on investment from research through the pursuit of commercialization objectives

*Federal SBIR funds may not be used to support Phase III projects

SBIR Phase I

- At least 2/3 of work, as determined by budget expenditures, must be performed at proposing organization
- Equipment May be requested, but should not exceed 10% of budget
- Consultant pay rate cannot exceed \$608/day or 8 hours/day
- Fee May be requested. Not to exceed 7% of total Federal funds requested



Center of Excellence

- Several NIFA programs allow for eligible applicants to be considered as a Center for Excellence
- Justification must be included as part of the proposal narrative and counts against the page limit
- Impact on Application Review tie breaker
- COE designation is for a particular grant program

IDC Limitations

- Indirect Cost limitations are determined by the congressional authority under which the funding is made available
 - The cap is usually based on Total Federal Funds
 - Use the lesser of the capped rate or your NIDCR

Example: A 30% of TFF cap translates to a IDC rate of 42.857% (or 30/70)

	Use your NIDCR	Use TFF cap
Direct Cost	\$350,000	\$350,000
MTDC	\$290,000	\$315,000
IDC @ 51%	\$147,900	\$160,650
IDC @ NIFA Cap (42.857%)	\$150,000	\$150,000
Total Cost	\$497,900	\$500,000

IDC Limitations cont.

- These limitations also apply to joint-programs with other Federal agencies when USDA is your awarding agency
- If the program is funded by an Agency that does not have a statutory ceiling on IDC recovery, your full IDC should be applied.
 - Best practice: Use your NIDCR unless funding opportunity provides other instructions.

Cost Sharing

- NIFA AFRI:
 - If an applied Research or Integrated Project with an applied research component, is commodity-specific and not of national scope, the grant recipient is required to match the USDA funds awarded 1-to-1
 - Equipment Grants: Federal funds may not exceed 50% or \$50,000 of the equipment cost.
- NIFA non-AFRI: depends on program (some waivers may apply)

NIFA Proposal Review Process



Panel review, score and discuss to rank proposals into 5 categories "outstanding," "high priority," "medium priority," "low priority," and "do not fund."

Other USDA Agencies

Other USDA Agencies

- May or may not have RFA
- Indirect cost restrictions and cost share requirements may be indicated in RFA or may depend on award instrument
 - Examples of cost share requirements:
 - NRCS CIG 50% of total project costs
 - Forest Service required/whenever possible (depends on award instrument)

Natural Resources Conservation Service

- Provides financial and technical assistance over a wide variety of programs.
 - Most are through direct assistance to producers
 - Conservation Innovation Grants are most likely source of grants for public and private sector sponsored programs
 - Submission requirements may include: submission to appropriate State Conversationist(s), Grants.gov, and via email to NRCS


Forest Service

- Congress established the Forest Service in 1905 to provide quality water and timber for the nation's benefit
- Congress later directed the Forest Service to broaden its management scope



- Current mission: To sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of the nation's forests and grasslands to meet the needs of present and future generations.
- Manages and protects 193 million acres of land, roughly the size of Texas
 - 154 national forests and 20 grasslands in 43 states and Puerto Rico.
- Supports sustainable management on approx. 500 million acres of private, state and tribal forests

 - Indirect Cost Limitation, Matching Requirements
- Required budget on a FS spreadsheet (FS1500-17b)
- Required compliance forms (including Financial Capability Questionnaire FS1500-22)

If this option is selected, the application organization should submit an e-mail request to the NIFA mailbox at: electronic@nifa.usda.gov. The e-mail's subject line should read, "Request to Establish a 10% De Minimis Indirect Cost Rate".

Acceptance of the 10 percent de minimis rate is predicated upon the following conditions:

- the non-Federal entity has never received a Negotiated Indirect Cost Rate Agreement (NICRA) from a Federal agency and is therefore eligible for the 10 percent de minimis rate;
- 2) that no costs other than those incurred by the non-Federal entity will be recovered by using the 10 percent de minimis rate and such costs are legal obligations of the non-Federal entity,
- 3) that the same costs that have been treated as indirect costs have not been claimed as direct costs, and
- 4) that similar types of costs have been accorded consistent treatment.





Compliance

- USDA is holding up awards until IACUC and IRB approvals are received (NIFA)
- Responsible Conduct of Research
- USDA enforces Animal Welfare Act
- Tracking cost-share obligations

Auditing

USDA considerations for audit selection process:

- No previous NIFA audits
- Amount of annual funding
- Request from a National Program Leader, Awards Management Division, or the University/Institution
- Significant/unresolved A-133 audit findings
- OIG Hotline/whistleblower Complaints
