

# Research Development for Research Administrators Mini-Intensive

## Overview:

- Provide practical tools or approaches that research administrators can bring back to their institutions to strengthen RD-related efforts.

## Preferred Qualifications:

- 5+ years of experience in research development, research administration, or strategic research support roles.
- Strong understanding of the extramural funding landscape and proposal development lifecycle.
- Experience supporting faculty in developing competitive proposals through strategic planning, resource alignment, or team science facilitation.



- Ability to communicate the value of RD in practical terms to those unfamiliar with the concept.
- Strong presentation and facilitation skills; prior experience teaching or training is a plus.

**Ideal Presenter Profile:**

Professionals with experience in both research development and research administration—or those who have worked closely across these domains—to guide research administrators in expanding their understanding of RD. Presenters should bring a collaborative mindset, practical insights, and the ability to engage a diverse group of learners.
