## URMIA Accepting Applications for Student Scholarship

**Bloomington, Ind.** – The University Risk Management & Insurance Association (URMIA) is now accepting applications for its 2018 Student Educational Scholarship. Up to three scholarships will be awarded. Each provides an award of \$2,500 for qualified college expenses, plus full funding to attend URMIA’s 2018 Annual Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah. The application deadline is March 15, 2018.

The scholarship is intended for full-time students seeking a risk management degree at a four-year institution of higher education in the U.S., or for students currently enrolled in a two-year community college who plan to continue their education as juniors at a four-year institution in the fall semester this year. Applicants must be rising juniors, seniors or masters/doctoral candidates. Preference will be given to applicants who express a desire to pursue a risk management career in higher education.
